From 1991 to 2019, this annual program provided enrichment opportunities for Jonestown junior high students and volunteer opportunities for high school students from around the country.





Piano

For 20 years, Dolores Fields Mason taught music to the young people of Jonestown and organized recitals twice each year. Dolores passed away in February 2022, about month before Sister Kay.

Girls to Women

For more than 10 years, the 7th and 8th grade members planned and taught weekly lessons to younger brothers, sisters and cousins.

Girls to Women Group with visiting volunteers from St. Mary's Academy Portland.



Volunteers from Holy Names Schools and public universities came on summer and spring breaks for service-learning trips. They were immersed in Jonestown and helped with labor-intensive projects such as painting and repairs.

Boys Volunteer Club

Members of Boys Volunteer Club helped in so many ways: in the community garden, setting up and cleaning after events in the resource Center, packing and delivering meals and gifts, carrying the banner in the monthly Peace Vigil walks and more.





Community Garden

Adults and children in Jonestown, along with many visiting volunteers, tilled, planted, weeded and harvested the community garden each year.

After School

Junior and senior high school students came after school to do homework. Donated computers and printers helped them succeed.



College Scholarships

Over many years, several donors made it possible for our Jonestown students who give of themselves in community service to attend and complete college. These young men and women continue to volunteer and lift up others.



Civil Rights

To help the young people of Jonestown become greater advocates for civil rights, Sister Kay organized regular trips to Alabama to visit historic locations in Selma, Montgomery and Birmingham.

Monthly Peace Vigil walks through Jonestown engaged students and brought awareness to residents.

Where Are They Now?

Watching children grow into responsible adults was a special pleasure for Sister Kay. Many Durocher Services participants like Artidra went on to be teachers, making a difference in many lives.

What's Next?

Now that there are no Sisters of the Holy Names in the Mississippi Delta, 15 volunteers in and out of the area have come together to begin planning ways to keep the Durocher Services Volunteer Ministry programs going. During a meeting with residents of the town in February, we set goals and identified ways that we will work

together. The Sisters of the Holy Names have donated the program's three vehicles to Black Parents United Foundation (BPUF) and transferred the lease of the Resource Center to them. The Sisters will be "walking with" these folks, who will take the lead in working with each other to serve the people of Jonestown.
