

Living the spirit and charism of Blessed Marie Rose



Founded in 1843 in Longueuil, Quebec, the Congregation of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary focused on the ministry of “religious education to the poor and most abandoned children.” (SNJM Chronicles, 1850.) The congregation’s foundress, Blessed Marie Rose Durocher, sought God in all things and felt called to educate the poor, to empower struggling people spiritually and intellectually, and to enable those within her influence to develop their full potential. This is the Sisters’ **charism** — the gift they contribute to the Church and the world.

What does it mean to be an SNJM-sponsored ministry?

As Sisters of the Holy Names we are called to give new life to the expression of the charism of our time. We believe that liberating action which aims at the full development of the human person is at the heart of our mission of education in all our ministries.

The U.S.-Ontario Province of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary sponsors numerous ministries that share the congregation's name, its purpose and its spirit. As sponsor, the Province is both the recipient and carrier of the Gospel vision, values, charism and tradition of Blessed Marie Rose Durocher, who founded the Sisters of the Holy Names in 1843. Given the long history of the congregation, sponsorship is a relatively recent development:

- For most of the congregation's existence, the Holy Names ministries were led by the Sisters, as were the ministries of most religious groups. Over time, the Sisters chose to form partnerships with others who share the same sense of mission. As lay persons became more strongly engaged in ministry leadership, the ministries' structures of governance had to evolve to accommodate both civil law and canon (church) law. *This document provides an introduction to the sponsorship relationships that apply to the Incorporated Province Ministries listed on the next page.*
- **Guiding values:** Each sponsored ministry upholds the following values of the Sisters of the Holy Names:

Best practices of boards

Legal and ethical duties

1. **Duty of care:** Refers to board members' responsibility to participate actively in making decisions on behalf of the organization and to exercise their best judgment while doing so.
2. **Duty of loyalty:** When acting on behalf of the organization in a decision-making capacity, board members must set aside their own personal and professional interests. The organization's needs come first.
3. **Duty of obedience:** Board members bear the legal responsibility of ensuring that the organization remains true to its mission and purpose by its compliance with all applicable federal, state and canonical laws.

Responsibilities of a Trustee/Director

Actively participate.

- Provide time, talent, and treasure
- Attend meetings/events
- Serve on committees, carry out assignments
- Help raise money

Be informed.

- Know about mission, programs
- Prepare for meetings
- Stay current with related issues and organizations
- Ask questions

Promote the organization.

- Spread the word
- Recruit board members and other volunteers

Safeguard ethics and values.

- Follow conflict-of-interest and confidentiality policies
- Refrain from asking special favors from staff

Be an ambassador for the organization. For example:

- Give presentations about the organization
- Educate elected officials
- Understand the organization's public relations philosophy

Volunteer for the organization.

- Understand the organization's programs
- Build a positive organizational culture through volunteering

In brief: Being an SNJM "sponsored ministry"

- Sponsorship by the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary provides the ministry's structural link to the Catholic Church.
- The ministry is expected to reflect the values and mission of the Sisters of the Holy Names in its own mission, programs, and interactions with all constituencies.
- That the organization's corporate structure is two-tiered and gives certain reserved powers to the Province through the Members of the Corporation. (This document explains the structure.)
- That the ministry benefits from the services of the SNJM Incorporated Province Ministries Office.
- That the chief executive of the ministry and trustees/directors of the ministry's board may be asked to participate in periodic meetings with the Members or with the Coordinator of Incorporated Ministries and to provide periodic information.
- That the ministry has the opportunity to request an annual financial contribution from the Province.
- That the ministry benefits from its association with the Sisters and their positive reputation among many of the organization's constituents.

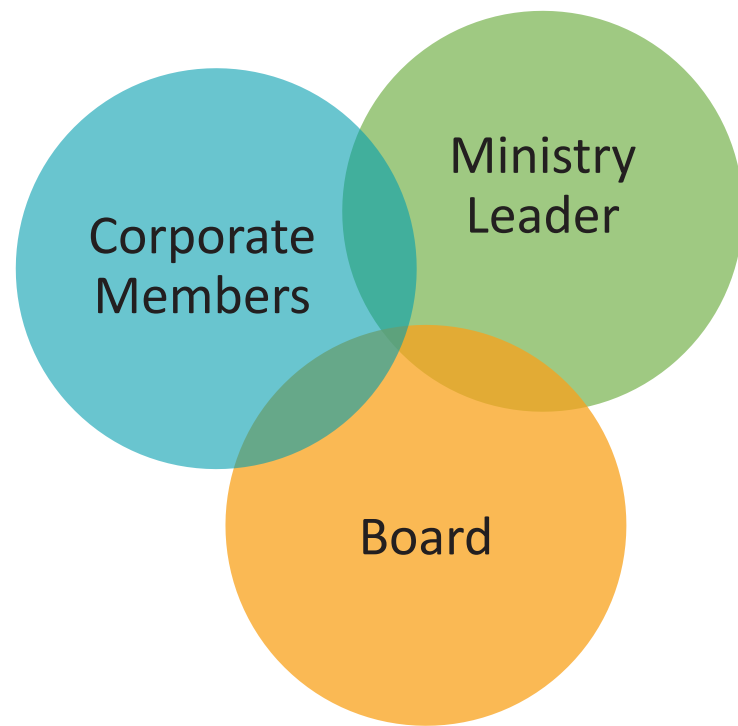
The Incorporated Province Ministries

The Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary in the U.S.-Ontario Province are sole sponsors of nine educational ministries and a continuing care retirement community. Since their founding, these ministries have carried out the Sisters' vision of the transformative power of full development of the human person:

1. Founded in 1859: St. Mary's Academy, Portland, OR
2. 1868: Holy Names High School, Oakland, CA
3. 1868: Holy Names University, Oakland, CA
4. 1880: Holy Names Academy, Seattle, WA
5. 1881: Academy of the Holy Names, Tampa, FL
6. 1884: Academy of the Holy Names, Albany, NY
7. 1889: Ramona Convent Secondary School, Alhambra, CA
8. 1982: Holy Names Music Center, Spokane, WA
9. 1994: Next Step Learning Center, Oakland, CA
10. 2001: Mary's Woods at Marylhurst, OR

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Responsibilities



Corporate Members

The Provincial Superior of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary U.S.-Ontario Province will appoint the individuals who make up the Member tier of each Incorporated Ministry. At least three of the Members will be Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary U.S.-Ontario Province. They have the ultimate responsibility for the mission of any incorporated ministry. The ministry's articles of incorporation or bylaws spell out the Member responsibilities, which include:

- Ensuring the SNJM mission, charism and values are lived out in the ministry;
- Working with the board and approving decisions regarding leasing, selling and encumbering of real property;
- Approving the merger or dissolution of the corporation;
- Approving the lending, borrowing or establishing lines of credit;
- Reviewing the annual financial reports;
- Confirming the appointment or removal of the Ministry Leader;
- Confirming the appointment or removal of directors/trustees;
- Approving amendments to the Articles of Incorporation/Charter and the Bylaws;
- Being aware and celebrating the good work done through the ministries;
- Supporting the ministry in conjunction with the Province Leadership Team with resources through the Office of the Incorporated Province Ministries.

The Board of Directors/Trustees

The board is understood by the state to be the ultimately responsible "person." The local trustees or directors include lay men and women, SNJMs, and members of other religious communities. Corporate Members approve the directors/trustees. The board's authority is articulated in the articles of incorporation, bylaws, and the board handbook and is monitored by the board chairperson. The board is responsible for:

- Faithfully furthering the SNJM mission, charism and guiding values;
- Ensuring that the ministry's administration monitors and strengthens programs and services;
- Ensuring effective strategic planning and assisting in implementing and monitoring the plan's goals;
- Setting policies and ensuring high-quality standards while maintaining legal and ethical integrity;
- Ensuring adequate financial resources and managing the corporation's property, affairs, business and concerns;
- Being fiscally responsible and good stewards of resources;
- Selecting and evaluating the Ministry Leader;
- Building a competent board and assessing the performance of board functions;
- Enhancing the organization's public standing.

Ministry Leader

The leader ensures a healthy organization by effectively managing human and material resources. The leader is accountable to the Board of Directors/Trustees; as an ex-officio member of the board, she/he participates in all general board meetings (with or without voting privileges). Core responsibilities include:

- Fostering a culture and establishing structures for the integration of the SNJM mission, vision, and values;
- Providing excellence in education which brings about the full development of the human person;
- Committing to be an educator of the faith and embracing the persons and names of Jesus and Mary;
- Committing oneself and the ministry to justice in the service of others;
- Exhibiting sound and ethical operational practices toward the goal of financial stability, program excellence and future vitality and viability of the ministry;
- Implementing strategies, systems, processes for efficient and effective accomplishments of the strategic plan;
- Carrying out board policies and developing a culture of involving decision-makers at the level of impact;
- Implementing and assessing high-quality standards for personnel, students, clients and services.
